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## Introduction

It has been a year and a half since the B'AI Global Forum was launched on 30 July 2020.

The main focus of our mission is on how to better realize the social goal of ensuring an equal society and the rights of minorities in an age where AI permeates every aspect of society. This report is a summary of our research and educational activities for the second year until the end of March 2022.

B'AI includes faculty members, researchers, and graduate students from the University of Tokyo, as well as people from other organizations in Japan and abroad. By bringing together a diverse group of members and actively exchanging ideas, we will build new understanding and value.

Since COVID-19 has still spread this year, we were unable to conduct face-to-face activities in FY2021 as in the previous year, but even so we continued to explore opportunities for interaction between research, industry, public agencies, and private organizations, especially among researchers, students, and journalists from Japan and abroad. Last year, as we searched for ways to interact with people in a world where national borders are closed, we were able to establish the connections that are possible using digital technology. There was also on-the-ground sense and knowledge gained from being forced to work in the digital space for a prolonged time.

As face-to-face activities become more and more common from now on, we would like to develop a discussion on AI and society for the inclusion of diverse people, keeping in mind the interactions among people that digital technology has made possible.

In other words, the name of our project shows our goal of conducting a multi-perspective analysis on the history and social structure that produced and enabled modern technologies such as AI.

## Project Overview

- The B'AI Global Forum Project searches for effective ways to realize our social goal of creating a gender-equal society and guaranteeing minority rights in the era where AI permeates every aspect of our lives. Today's world faces serious challenges, with ever-continuing economic gap and discrimination based on race, ethnicity, and gender. In particular, as forms of communication mediated by digital technologies have become increasingly conspicuous in all realms of society, including politics, economy, and culture, especially since the spread of COVID-19 in 2020, the economic gap and discriminations are said to be worsening throughout the world. In order to confront such social challenges, our project questions the fundamental values of modernity that have prioritized the progress of science and technology, and also promotes the intellectual endeavor to understand the formation of the contemporary social institutions and organizational structure. We plan to do this by working in collaboration with researchers, practitioners, journalists, and other citizens to identify current problems and seek and propose solutions so that the latest technology, such as AI, can enrich every human life.



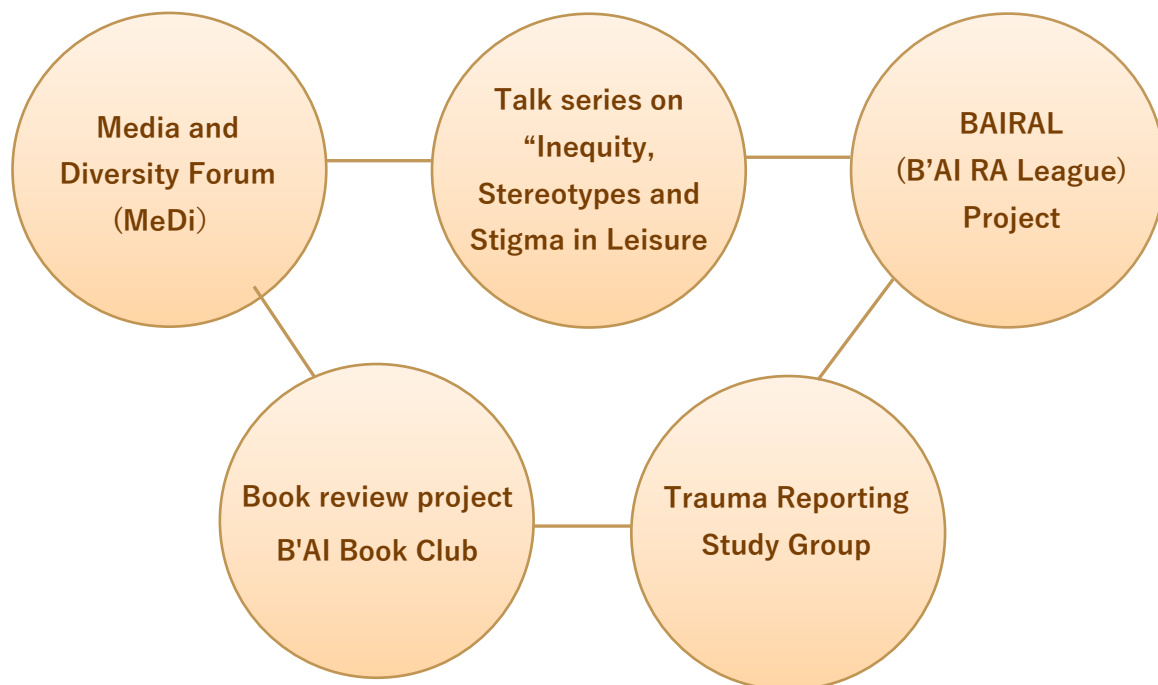
## Two Goals

- Critically and self-reflexively examining the relationship between society and digital information technologies, including AI
- Realizing fair and just discourse in the public sphere

## Four Themes

- Analyze discrimination and violence against women and minorities by the digital information technologies, including AI
- Design a diverse and inclusive mediascape by the digital information technologies, including AI
- Create an interdisciplinary global forum where young researchers, entrepreneurs, practitioners, and other citizens come together to discuss issues related to AI and society
- Reconceptualize ethics for the digital information age and practice inclusive education based on those ethics

## Projects



### Media and Diversity Forum (MeDi)

- “Media and Diversity Forum (MeDi)” is a discussion forum for researchers and journalists, as well as a network that engages both activism and research. Since media representations are influential enough to create norms for daily life, it has been pointed out that inappropriate representations can become a human rights issue, leading to discrimination, bullying, and harassment in workplaces and schools. MeDi points out these media issues and explores the positive possibilities and future challenges of the digital information society, in collaboration with researchers and practitioners from around the world. - MeDi conducts workshops for reporters, directors, and editors working in the media field, where they discuss issues of gender expression in news coverage of various topics and how to improve them, giving examples of actual cases. In FY2021, the workshop “Considering

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Olympic and Paralympic Games Coverage and Its Gender Representation” was held on 28 August, and the workshop “Considering the House of Representatives Election Coverage and Its Gender Representation” was held on 5 December, bringing together practitioners and researchers to actively share ideas and exchange views on the issues.

### Talk Series on “Inequity, Stereotypes, and Stigma in Leisure”

- Artificial intelligence (AI) has already made itself indispensable in leisure and is impacting the ways in which we relate to society and how we find contentment as people. Also embedded in leisure time activities, online or off, are structures of discrimination, stifling of leisure time activities based on stereotypes and stigma. The aim of this project is to investigate and reflect on the ways in which inequity, stereotypes, and stigma have been embedded into leisure culture. We place this as foundational work that will be useful to critique the ways in which AI may quietly perpetuate inequity, stereotypes, and stigma in our leisure pursuits.

### BAIRAL Project

- BAIRAL (B’AI RA League) is a study session by young research assistants (RA) at the B’AI Global Forum. This study group examines the relationships between artificial intelligence (AI) and society from both theoretical and practical aspects. Today, AI has shown many potential

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applications in our daily lives, but it has also created new power relations and risks. In order to understand politics, society, and culture in these times, and to weave norms of human dignity and freedom into new technologies, we need to acquire interdisciplinary perspectives. Our aim is to create a network of people who are engaged in research and practices in a variety of fields, in order to discuss the realization of a better society through AI. To this end, BAIRAL organizes monthly research meetings with guest speakers in a variety of fields.

## B'AI Book Club

- B'AI Book Club is a book review project in which members of the B'AI Global Forum read foreign literature that examines information technology such as artificial intelligence (AI) and algorithms from a critical perspective. Today, as AI permeates every corner of human society, it is being pointed out that technology does not actually work in a neutral and fair manner and that its benefits are not equally distributed to all members of society. In Japan, however, there is little literature that examines such issues. Therefore, the B'AI Global Forum launched the B'AI Book Club as a new project starting in 2021, which is a book review session where we read the literature that has not yet been introduced to Japan, understand overseas research trends, and also discuss issues such as the power behind the development and use of AI, and the problems of masculinity currently inherent in science and technology. The way we read books is not simply to understand the content of the book, but to critically read it while comprehensively considering the author's background, the social context in which the book was written, and the position of the book in the relevant research field.

### Trauma Reporting Study Group

- The Trauma Reporting Study Group is a new project launched in FY2021 as part of the effort to create a fair public discourse space. The study group, chaired by Michiko Kawahara, who is a journalist and project professor of the Interfaculty Initiative in Information Studies at the

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University of Tokyo, brings together people with experience in reporting and journalism researchers to learn the skill and knowledge necessary to cover and tell the stories of vulnerable people who have suffered physical and mental damage, such as victims of incidents and (sexual) violence, disaster victims, and survivors of war and conflict, and to share issues and explore new ways forward.

- In FY2021, the Trauma Reporting Study Group held eight reading sessions to read and discuss a book by Jo Healey of BBC, *Trauma Reporting: A Journalist's Guide to Covering Sensitive Stories*.

## Educational Activities

### Courses

- The B'AI Global Forum has organized a class “Artificial Intelligence and Society” for students in the junior division in the Summer Semester 2021 of the University of Tokyo. The class, conducted in English, was facilitated by Professors Yuko Itatsu and Yujin Yaguchi of the Graduate School of Interdisciplinary Information Studies at the University of Tokyo and featured guest speakers, such as Project Prof. Yukie Nagai from the International Research Center for Neurointelligence at the University of Tokyo, Ms. Sputniko! who is an associate professor at the Tokyo University of Arts, Ms. Asumi Saito who is a co-founder of Waffle.org. In addition, Prof. Kaori Hayashi, Prof. Yujin Yaguchi, and Associate Prof. Ai Hisano from the B'AI Global Forum gave lectures. The essay collection by nine students who took the class has been published on the B'AI website.

### Other Educational Activities

- In April 2021, the B'AI Global Forum held a hands-on workshop “Introduction to Data Analysis with R,” in collaboration with The Carpentries, which is an international NPO launched in the United States. The workshop was held five times online for graduate students and researchers at the University of Tokyo, and instructors from The Carpentries provided lectures for beginners on the statistical analysis tool R.
- On 28 May 2021, Associate Prof. Ai Hisano gave an online lecture titled “Taste and Vision in History: The Transformation of ‘Aesthetics’ and the Rise of Consumer Society.” After the lecture, Prof. Shunji Yamanaka of the Interfaculty Initiative in Information Studies and the Institute of Industrial Science at the University of Tokyo, who is known as a leading expert in the design field, provided comments. The speakers, Associate Prof. Hisano and Prof. Yamanaka, and the moderator, Prof. Kaori Hayashi, discussed the progress of science and technology and its application to society, as well as its impact on society, taking questions from the audience.

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- On 9 June 2021, Prof. Kaori Hayashi and Prof. Shin Mizukoshi gave presentations in the online seminar “AI and Society: New Media Literacy and Politics” hosted by the Institute for Creative & Cultural Entrepreneurship, Goldsmiths, University of London. Prof. Hayashi gave a presentation on “Challenges for a Gender-equal Society in the AI Era” and Prof. Mizukoshi presented “New Literacy for Media Infrastructure and ‘Media Biotope.’”
  - On 1 October 2021, Prof. Yuko Itatsu was interviewed by the “High Teen Conference” organized by the Department of Children’s Education, Nakano-ku, Tokyo. The “High Teen Conference,” in which junior and senior high school students living and attending school in Nakano-ku, Tokyo get together to decide on a theme and interview specialists and related organizations on that theme, interviewed Prof. Itatsu on one of the FY2021 themes, “AI.” The 2021 High Teen Conference Report has been posted on the Nakano-ku’s website.
  - On 17 January 2022, the B’AI Global Forum hosted in the fourth public seminar of the “Science Cafe” series by the Institute for AI and Beyond. Dr. Shuang Lu Frost, Assistant Professor at Aarhus University, was invited as guest speaker and Ayumi Koso, Director of the National BioResource Project PR Office at the National Institute of Genetics, was invited as science communicator, while Associate Professor Ai Hisano of the B’AI Global Forum took the stage to discuss “Social Imaginary of AI in East Asia.”
  - On 16 February 2022, Project Prof. Takane Ito gave a lecture on “Education for Diversity in Universities” at a workshop organized by the Affiliated Schools Faculty Joint Committee of the Faculty of Education and Human Studies of Akita University, which was held online.

## Collaborative Research

- The B'AI Global Forum is conducting the “Four-Country Survey on Awareness of AI Use” in collaboration with Prof. Hiromi Yokoyama’s laboratory at the Kavli Institute for the Physics and Mathematics of the Universe at the University of Tokyo. As AI research and development is advancing and being introduced into various decision-making processes, AI researchers and developers are required to have a sense of equality to ensure that AI does not cause injustice to grow. This research examines how attitudes toward equality regarding gender, disability, sexual orientation, and immigration relate to awareness of AI use among the general public in Japan, the United States, Germany, and Korea. Data have been collected in FY2021, and an interim report was presented by Prof. Yokoyama and Associate Prof. Yuko Ikkatai of Kanazawa University at the 23rd Research Seminar of the Institute for AI and Beyond held on 1 February 2022. The final findings of the research will be presented during FY2022.




## Field Trips

### The 2nd Artificial Intelligence Exhibition & Conference (Autumn)

- On 29 October 2021, Atsuko Sano and Kayoung Kim of the B'AI Global Forum visited the 2nd Artificial Intelligence Exhibition & Conference Autumn (AI EXPO) at Makuhari Messe in Japan. It was an opportunity to learn the latest trends in business and research institutions, as well as various examples of AI applications from the AI EXPO.

### Dialogue Diversity Museum “Dialogue Forest (*Taiwa no Mori*)”

- On 30 March 2022, several members of the B'AI Global Forum visited the Dialogue Diversity Museum “Dialogue Forest (*Taiwa no Mori*),” known as the first museum in Japan where



visitors can experience diversity while enjoying entertainment. Participants experienced “Dialogue in the Dark,” a journey in the dark guided by a person with visual impairment, and “Dialogue in Silence,” a communication experience in a world without sound guided by a deaf person, and listened to a lecture by Mr. Shinsuke Shimura, Founder of Dialogue in the Dark Japan, entitled “Creating Darkness and Silence in the City: Learning from Diversity and Innovation.”

## Other Activities

### Dialogue for Further Research

- On 29 May 2021, Professor Yuko Itatsu exchanged ideas with Japanese women working as computer science engineers in North America and Japan. There were suggestions on science and mathematics education and the working environment for gender minorities in Japan from a comparative perspective between Japan and the US.
- Aiming to investigate the use of AI for learning by children with physical disabilities, the B'AI Global Forum began preparations to have deaf children use a device (VR headset) to experience virtual reality and conduct a survey on their experience of the device. The purpose of this survey is to examine the impact of hearing impairment on children's learning and the benefits of using virtual reality devices for learning. On 15 July 2021, a meeting was held between Professor Yuko Itatsu and Asuka Ando (Ph.D student at the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, The University of Tokyo; faculty member at Meisei Gakuen) to discuss this matter.
- Discussions were held with researchers who plan to launch an international comparative study on “Imaginations of Artificial Intelligence” in the Department of Communication and Media Research at the University of Zurich.

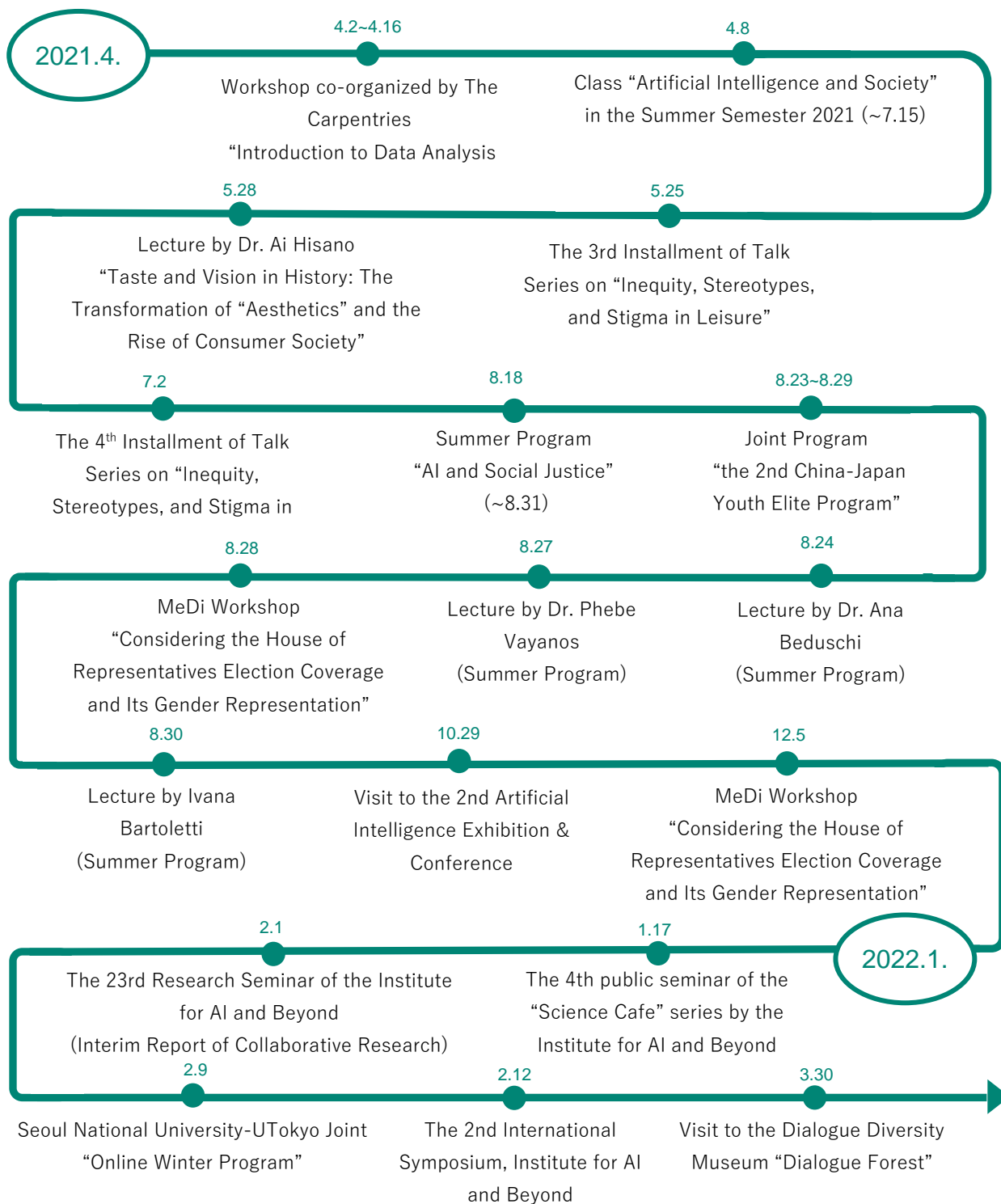
### Furnishing a Library Corner
